English – Diary Entries: Chronological Order

Look at the Diary Entry Overview and read the section about chronological order. Do you know what this means? It means in order of when things happened. This means diary entries are written in time order of days/months. They won't be sporadically placed for example: December 1st 2019; October 16th 2019; February 14th 2020; January 5th 2020. Instead the diary entries would be in order of when they happened: October 16th 2020; December 1st 2019; January 5th 2020; February 14th 2020.

Put the year of birth of all the members of the household in chronological order.

A single diary entry is often also written in chronological order. The narrator will start by describing their morning, then their afternoon and then their evening.

Choose seven things you do in a day and put each action into a sentence. Write your sentences in chronological order.
